Newsletter Redesign

We're excited to present the redesigned St. Paul's Newsletter. Beginning this Advent, publications will be produced on a seasonal schedule six times per year: Advent, Winter, Lent, Spring, Summer, and Fall.

What is the importance of Advent?

Starting four Sundays before Christmas, the Advent season marks the beginning of the new church year. The word Advent derives from the Latin *adventus*, which means “coming.” This expectant season prepares us for the celebration of the coming of Christ - calling us to slow down and ready for Christ’s glorious coming.

This year, Advent will begin on Sunday, November 27, also referred to as Advent 1. While each week prepares us for Jesus’ birth, each of the four weeks have individual themes: The first Sunday – the Second Coming; the final return of Christ in victory. The second and third Sundays – John the Baptist, his role, his words, and his teachings. The Fourth Sunday – the events immediately preceding Jesus’ birth.

Pick up your kit starting Sunday, November 20.

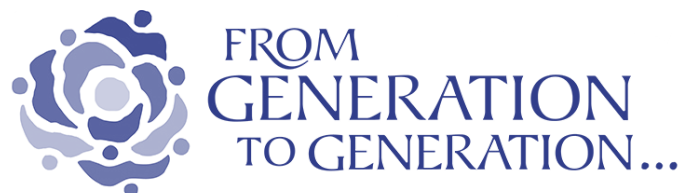
Kits and devotionals are available near the Sanctuary Reception Desk.

Beginning with the first Sunday in Advent, this daily devotional follows the Revised Common Lectionary through Epiphany.



At St. Paul’s, Advent services will begin in darkness, with the light from the candles being held by choir members foretelling of the greater light to come. The Advent Wreath, symbolizing God’s unending love and eternal life, contains four candles to be lit one-by-one on the four Sundays leading to Christmas, and the central candle, the Christ Candle, to be lit at Christmas. Each week, we draw nearer to God’s glorious gift to us all.

By recognizing the season of Advent, we gain the richness and the benefit of experiencing the promise, longing, hope, and expectation of the season. This time of preparation and waiting allows us to truly celebrate Christmas.



This year’s devotional, *From Generation to Generation*, reminds us of the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. The work of God is always unfolding—in and through us. This Advent, may you remember that you belong—to a story etched into the wrinkles of time, to generations that have come before and will come after, to a love that won’t let you go.

1st Sunday - November 27



As you enter the Sanctuary for worship, the lights will be dimmed and the choir will line the side aisles with candles during which we will join to sing "O Come, O Come Emmanuel."

Members of our St. Paul's family will light the first candle on the Advent Wreath while we all proclaim "May the light sent from God shine in the darkness to show us the way of salvation."

2nd Sunday - December 4

Advent Lessons & Carols

The first service of Christmas Lessons and Carols was held in 1880, at Truro Cathedral, to offer a religious celebration as an alternative to the festivities in the local pubs. The service was based on the well-known format of scripture readings interspersed with carols. We continue this tradition with Christmas Lessons and Carols services on Christmas Eve, but we precede those services with Advent Lessons and Carols.

Preparing for Christmas, our service of Advent Lessons and Carols takes us through the prophecies and God's promises of the Messiah that is coming. With readings from Isaiah, Joel and Zechariah - hearing how the Messiah will inaugurate God's kingdom of love and peace. We follow with readings from Luke and Mark- where an angel tells Mary that she will give birth to Jesus and John the Baptist reminds us that Christ is coming.

The St. Paul's Choir and St. Paul's Treble Choir lead the music, which includes Advent favorites and some lesser known hymns. We end with Charles Wesley's outstanding hymn "Lo, he comes with clouds descending". As part of the service, the Treble Choir will sing the Great Advent Antiphons, on which the hymn "O come, O come, Emmanuel" is based. (for more information, see page 7)

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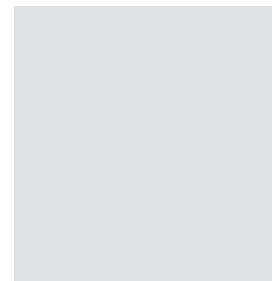

Christmas Day - December 25

"Yea, Lord, we greet thee; born this happy morning"

In Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol, we read of the church bells ringing on Christmas morning and calling one and all to church and chapel to worship before sharing the Christmas Dinner. This year, we are being called to worship on Christmas Day too. Maybe you will come because you come to church every Sunday, or maybe this will be your first time. Either way, we will enjoy celebrating on the day that Christ is born!



Seasonal Anthem

"O Come, O Come Emmanuel" - talked to Joel about photo

Special to us during Advent, this great hymn has a history that stretches back more than 1,200 years to the Great Advent Antiphons. An antiphon is a sentence, sung to plainchant, that comes before and after a psalm or a canticle, rather like a bookend.

In the monastic tradition as far back as the 8th Century, when the Magnificat was sung at Vespers every day, it was preceded and followed by a different Advent Antiphon for each of the seven days leading up to Christmas. Each of these antiphons highlights a characteristic of the coming Christ: "O root of Jesse", "O wisdom", "O King of the Nations", "O Emmanuel", and so on.

In the 18th Century, a Latin poetic hymn version of the Antiphons first appeared in German hymnbooks, with an added refrain "Gaude, gaude, Emmanuel" (O come, O come, Emmanuel). In 1861, an English translation

of this Latin hymn by John Mason Neale appeared in "Hymns Ancient and Modern", set to the famous 15th Century French melody that we know: Veni Emmanuel. It is closely related to the hymn we sing ourselves every week in Advent. The text has been adjusted a little over the centuries, but we can still see that each verse is a prayer to the coming Christ.

Verse 1 is inspired by Isaiah 7:14 and Matthew 1:23. Look at Hymn 211 in our United Methodist Hymnal, and see if you can trace the scripture references for other verses.

Tamaleada Party

Preparing, cooking, and eating tamales together as a community is a cherished Christmas tradition throughout Mesoamerica. Families and friends come together for *Tamaleadas*, or tamale making parties, to divide and conquer the many labor-intensive and time consuming steps required to produce the delicious, leaf wrapped packages.

Whether you are 5 years old, 105 years old, or any age in between, you are invited and welcome to join.

Assembly lines will be formed to spread the masa, add the fillings, and fold the tamales. After being filled and folded, the tamales will be steamed and *listo!* (ready) to be picked up and eaten the next day.

Take a moment this season and join in *convivio* (gathering together for fellowship) to laugh, sing, listen to music, create memories, and be present with one another around the table as we share life together.

The day is divided into 3 three-hour increments to successfully make our tamales:

9 am- Noon, 1-4 pm, 5-8 pm. Registration is available on our events webpage or by calling the reception desk.

Filling for the tamales will be prepared on Thursday, December 15, and Friday, December 16. If you can help with making the red and green salsas, tearing meat, preparing vegetables, we will be excited to see you.

Care & Hospitality

Clinic Care by Rev. Andrew Wolfe

Throughout summer and fall, the Lectionary has featured prophets like Jeremiah, Isaiah, Amos, and Hosea. The role of a prophet is to stand in the gap between God and the people. Often prophets decry the powerful who profit from exploiting the land and the poor. Prophets speak hard words of truth and turn our attention to spaces of faithfulness, justice, and equity. Their work calls us today to have a prophetic imagination that pushes against powers and principalities, upends economic systems and challenges long-held beliefs.

Houston is a tale of two cities—gifted with the world’s largest medical center and yet plagued by systemic injustices: 28% of Houstonians are uninsured, 24% cannot afford to see a doctor, and a college educated black woman has nearly the same health outcome as a white woman who has not completed high school. As a result, the underserved have had a long history of mistrust toward medicine. On September 13, 2021, St. Paul’s



waded into the prophetic work of addressing health inequities in Houston through a partnership with the University of Houston’s College of Nursing to provide free healthcare to under/uninsured in our community.

Over the last year, the health clinic has stood in the gaps, proclaiming a vision of equity, inclusion, and dignity in healthcare. Over 175 patients have been welcomed into the clinic not as a number, but as a beloved child of God. Almost half of the clinic’s patients have no access to a primary care provider and many experience a complexity of health issues such as diabetes, blood pressure, emotional health, and substance abuse. Our nurse



practitioners are intentional about the quality care they give to body, mind, and spirit. This approach has enabled the clinic to gain the trust of our clients and led to the clinic being the medical home for many.

While the clinic offers a prophetic word and innovates the healthcare landscape through nurse managed care and telemedicine technology, the greatest strength of the clinic is the faith and faithfulness of its staff. From receptionist to provider, compassion, dignity, and respect

are at the forefront of patient-centered care. As simple as it seems, these values enable the clinic to make a difference in the lives of the under/uninsured community. That care is reflected in patient satisfaction surveys and anecdotally: One Monday morning the clinic staff were gathering for staff prayer when a patient, on his way out, stopped to say thank you and asked to join. The team circled together and after ‘amen’ said, ‘Y’all are family. This place is family to me.’”

These are prophetic words. Compassionate healthcare is prophetic work. A partnership between a church and university proclaims a more powerful way



to care for the community. There is still a great deal of work to be done; more strangers to welcome, more friendships to build, and more gaps to stand in. Prophetic work is risky and exhausting, but it never stops.

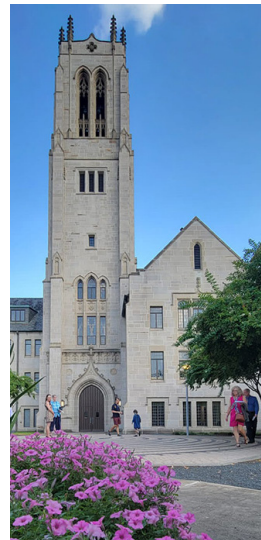

Find Hope, Peace, Joy, & Love this Season Walking the Labyrinth

To walk the labyrinth, enter near the statue of Jesus and follow the stone pathway to the center of the labyrinth and back out. Take whatever pace you would like.

Walking a labyrinth is a meditative practice observed across world religions. Archeologists have discovered labyrinths created by ancient societies that date back millennia. Unlike a maze, a labyrinth guides the traveler through a predetermined, circuitous path to its center point and back out. There are no diverging pathways where the traveler makes a conscious choice to turn right or left. In this way, the mind can relax as the body simply puts one foot in front of the other. This practice promotes contemplation and prayer.

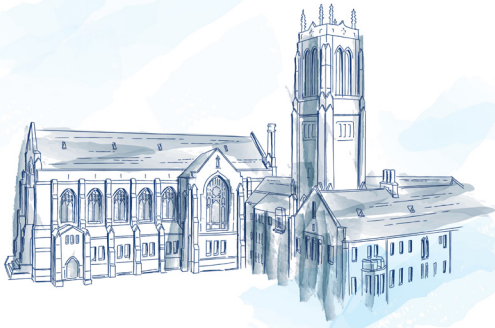

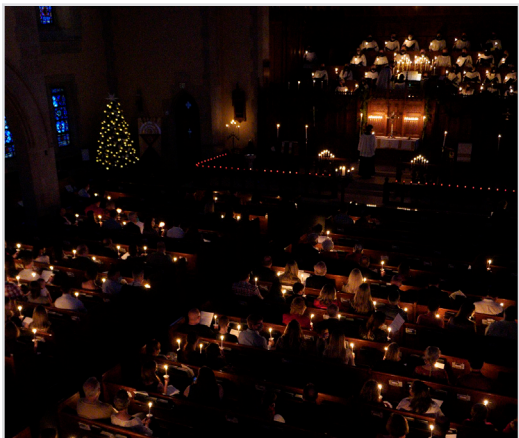
Your Christmas Gift to St. Paul's

Melissa also looks forward to her opportunity to serve, as she approaches completion of her degree. "I feel like that is what I'm led to do - to offer hope, to spread the word of God in a way that is just loving and supporting."

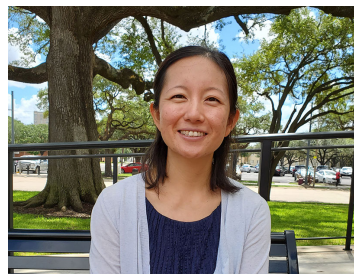

Fun Facts about the music you will hear at the concert:

Handel's anthem, "Zadok the Priest" was written for the coronation of British King George II in 1727 at Westminster Abbey, and has been sung at every British coronation since then.

Andrew Carter's "Benedicite" is a setting of the traditional canticle, The Song of Creation (in Latin: Benedicite omnia opera Domini), in which all of creation praises God: angels, heavens, sun and moon, trees of the forest, ice and snow, and many more. In his setting, Carter also includes three movements for children's choirs: Badgers and Hedgehogs, Butterflies and Moths, and Granies and Grandads, who also praise God. It was first performed in 1989 by the British Federation of Young Choirs, in Edinburgh Scotland. It was inspired by the restoration of the ceiling of the south transept of York Minster, which was destroyed by fire in 1984 and restored to include images of all of creation.

Brewer's "Marche Heroique" can easily be confused for another of Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance marches, and will be played by Joel Trezell at the concert.

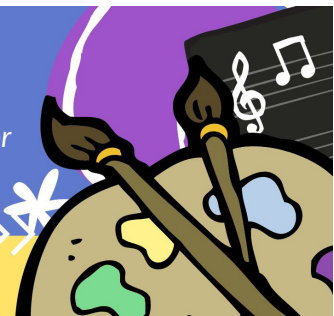

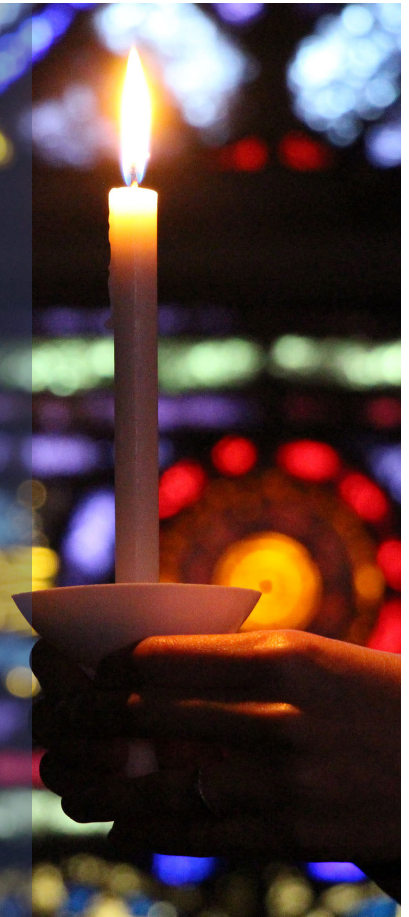
