Teleclinic Ends First Semester with Large Grant

As the telehealth clinic in Abraham Station completed its first semester of of once-a-week, half-day services on Monday, December 27, the Bert and Mae Dean Wheeler Foundation has granted \$550,000 to the clinic. These funds will enable the clinic, operated by the University of Houston School of Nursing in conjuction with St. Paul's, to provide services for up to four days a week through 2024.

"We're deeply grateful for this gift," said Rev. Andrew Wolfe, Minister for Congregational Care, "and for the contributions from members of St. Paul's who've helped us share the healing ministry of Jesus.

"Houston is a tale of two cities," Wolfe explained. "It boasts the world's largest medical center, but 28 percent of Houstonians lack healthcare insurance, and 24 percent of Harris County residents are unable to afford seeing a doctor. Since opening, this teleclinic has fought to provide greater healthcare access for the under/uninsured in our community."

During its brief existance, the UH telehealth clinic has served more than 40 clients, 23 of whom were seen more than once for follow-up visits.

One of the most important lessons learned in this semester is how great the stigma against the homeless is within the medical community, said Rev. Wolfe. "This population is often weary of receiving care because of how the healthcare system treats them. One client shared with Dr. Simi Varghese, our nurse practitioner, that seeing the clinic sign at Abraham Station gives him hope."

"I may not always need to come in,' he told her, 'but seeing the sign and knowing you're here makes me happy."



Refugees are people fleeing their countries due to war, violence, or persecution. They have been granted "refugee" status by the United Nations. If they wish to resettle in the U.S., they must go through an extensive vetting process involving multiple federal agencies. Around 90 percent of the refugees served by IMGH are self-sufficient within six months of arrival to the United States.


Looking Ahead
