Pastor's Message

You are all God's children through faith in Christ Jesus. All of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek: there is neither slave nor free; nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

— Galatians 3:26-28

As we celebrate the 4th of July and all the good things in our country, I'm reading through How to Heal Our Divides: A Practical Guide. It is a great series of essays reflecting how recent times have shown the inequities, systems of oppression, and deep divisions in our country. The book gives some



good advice on how to address these issues of division and how to address them in practical ways.

In the essay by Diana Butler Bass, she reminds us that being a

Christian is not about separating ourselves from others, but rather a declaration of our solidarity. The early church was successful because it set out a vision of unity in a deeply divided world. She writes, "Not only did the first Christians proclaim these words (Galatians 3), they practiced them in their communities. They developed habits of including others, of breaking down barriers, of eating with and befriending those whom they once found objectionable."

They were living out the commandment to love God and love others. That's the same call we have today, and it ties in nicely with the creed of the United States, e pluribus unum, out of many, one. As the hymn says, "and we pray that all unity may one day be restored."

St. Paul's Methodist Foundation Awards \$126,200 in Grants to 20 Ministries

awarded to this project by St.

St. Paul's Methodist Foundation of Houston has awarded \$109,200 to 17 Houston agencies to fund a variety of social service programs in 2021 and \$3600 from the Puckett Fund to the St. Paul's Choral Scholars. The Foundation has also awarded \$12,750 to Emanuel Luz de Vida, our Bolivian mission, from the Wilson and Nora Boots Mission Fund and \$650 to Encounter with Christ in the Caribbean from the Fund for Latin America. The 2021 total of \$126,200 in grant funding is a 25 percent increase over 2020's funding.

While a number of grant funds within the endowment have been established with designated purposes by their donors and are so awarded by the Grant Committee, as we emerge from the turbulence of this funding cycle, a special consideration was to enable agencies to move our neighbors from situations of need to a place of hope.

Starting this summer they will join Rev. Wolfe in providing spiritual care and support to our congregation in hospitals, homes, and senior living communities.

Caregiver Training, Support Group

If you are a dementia caregiver or help support someone who is a dementia caregiver, St. Paul's invites you to a six-week caregiver training offered through Amazing Place with a support group to follow.

Dementia is an isolating disease, not only for the individual, but also the caregiver. On average, family provides 80 percent of dementia care, but they often feel invisible, unheard, and lacking in support.

St. Paul's wants to create a space for families coping with dementia to find meaningful engagement and spiritual connection. This six-week class will cover important topics such as behavior management skills, interactive coaching, feedback, and insights on caregiver support. Classes begin Tuesday, July 20, from 11:30am to 1:30pm via Zoom.

Cornerstone Society Voting for Inaugural Grant Funding

Voting is underway through July 6 for the Cornerstone Society's inaugural grant funding. The St. Paul's Foundation Grants committee met in June and reviewed proposals from a number of qualified agencies. (See page 4.) Of these, five were selected as either worthy of funding or deserving of additional funding from the Cornerstone Society. These are briefly described below:

- Bo's Place. Serves more than 5,000 individuals annually
 has requested funding to train 1,000+ professionals and
 others supporting the bereaved in trauma-informed,
 bereavement-specific on-line workshops and trainings.
- Creative Life Foundation. Connects vulnerable and marginalized children and parents in urban and rural Thailand to critical resources that create a path to freedom and prevent human trafficking.
- FAM Houston. Builds community among refugees, immigrants, and local Houstonians, with a particular emphasis on empowering Congolese women as they cultivate a local farm to provide food and income for their families.
- Justice for Our Neighbors (aka Justice for All Immigrants).
 Provides low-income individuals and families with affordable, high-quality immigration legal services. The agency also engages in immigration education and advocacy.
- Loving Houston. Advances community transformation by enabling churches to partner with local schools in meeting the physical, emotional, and academic needs of their students.

Funds for Cornerstone Society grants totaled \$15,250, with half being directed to the Foundation's Building and

Facilities Fund and the remaining \$7,625 available to be granted to a non-profit selected by Cornerstone Society members through on-line voting. Each adult Society member has a vote, and children of family members are encouraged to vote as well.

The grant recipient will be announced by e-mail to members of the Cornerstone Society, in the August edition of *St. Paul's Monthly Newsletter*, on the website, and through social media.

Sunday School Lesson Inspires Children's Prayer Team Initiative

This spring as the GROW 2nd-5thgraders were studying the Book of Acts, learning how the early Chris-

tians took care of each other, the discussion moved to how St. Paul's Family takes care of each other. Among the ways noted was the Prayer Team, and a fourth grader asked if they could also write notes to members who are sick, forming their own Prayer

Team or creating cards for the current team to use.

That idea has grown into a Children's Prayer Team, and it is developing in several directions. Some of the

children are designing birthday and get well cards to be used as the need arises. Some children are taking on

specific assignments from the church-wide Prayer Team.

An idea under consideration is for the children to design and send cards to other children to celebrate the birth of new siblings. And some of the designs could be transformed into multiple use by others.

As more children transition to in-person Sunday School, they will have the opportunities to create their cards in group activities. In the meantime, this is a way for those attending virtually to feel connected.

Set Live Captions in Chrome Browser

Click on the three vertical dots in the upper right-hand corner, beneath the 'X.' Click on *Help* (near the bottom), then *About Google Chrome*. If you have Google Chrome Version 91.0.4472.114, continue. If not, re-install Chrome.

To activate Live Captions (aka closed captioning), click on those three dots again to open Chrome, then click on *Settings*. Go to *Advanced* (on left or scroll all the way to the bottom of the screen) and click on the downward arrow \blacktriangledown .

Click on *Accessibility* and move Live Caption button to right, turning it blue. Through the *Accessibility* menu you also can select color, size, and other parameters for your Live Captions.

This is not intended as an endorsement of Chrome, though Chrome is the most-used browser. Closed Captions may be pre-set on other browsers, devices, and individual programs or provide ways for them to be set.
