In the Old Testament book of Jeremiah we get a glimpse of the prophet's encounter with God in the $29^{\text {th }}$ chapter when God says, "I have it all planned out - plans to take care of you, not abandon you, plans to give you the future you hope for. When you call on me, when you come and pray to me,
 I'll listen. When you come looking for me, you'll find me. Yes, when you get serious about finding me and want it more than anything else, I'll make sure you won't be disappointed." (Jeremiah 29:11-13, The Message)

After talking about this hope, Jeremiah talks about prayer. Sometimes I wonder why we don't pray more. Why we do all the talking instead of more listening. ## Clinic to Expand Hours in September

The UH Telehealth Clinic at St. Paul's will be open on Thursdays as well as Mondays, starting in September. Previously open half days on Mondays, the hours for both days will expand to $8: 30 \mathrm{am}$ to $3: 30 \mathrm{pm}$.

Currently serving individuals age 13 and up, in order to also serve children, the clinic is seeking a nurse practitioner for pediatric care.

These expanded hours and services are being made possible by a $\$ 500,000$ grant from the Bert and Mae Dean Wheeler Foundation.

This clinic, which functions in Abraham Station that also houses the Emergency Aid Coalition, is becoming the medical home for people experiencing homelessness. The clinic's nurse practitioners in telecommunications with a medical doctor provide basic medical care and screening Rutagaba After-School Program Moving

To accommodate clinic's expanded hours, the Rutabaga After-School Program, which has been housed in Abraham Station for many years, will move to the Jones Building Basement where the GROW 3rd-5th-grade Sunday School classes also meet.

The Children's Council is working with a decorator and a team of volunteers to give the basement a fresh look with new flooring and updated design.
