# Worship at St. Paul's Amid COVID-19 Concerns

Thanks to the many members who responded to a survey conducted in late April about St. Paul's online worship. To the extent possible, these results have guided several changes to the way worship is presented and made accessible online. These responses also helped guide the Re-Gathering Task Force determine priorities as did guidance from the local medical community.

## **Easier Access to Online Worship**

An overlay to the website has made it easier to get to the online streaming page. From the homepage, simply click on "Worship Online," which is one of the only four choices, and takes you to www.stpaulshouston.org/live-stream.

Near the top of that page are the choices of watching the service on live-stream or YouTube. The same service is relayed at the same time through both means. Both options are provided to accommodate those for whom the YouTube service is more stable. (You also can subscribe to St. Paul's YouTube channel and go direct to it at any time.)

Also near the top of that page are buttons to access the worship bulletin and children's activity bulletins, make prayer requests, register attendance, and give online.

## Also on the Online Worship Page

Below those buttons are suggested ways to engage in worship while practicing social distancing; the service and sermon archive, including Wednesday messages; information about the upcoming Sunday services, including the Lectionary readings illuminated by art; "Words from our Pastors," which are the weekly messages emailed on Fridays and as needed, and COVID-19 updates. The page concludes with information about music at St. Paul's and the Weslayan Love Feast.

Small changes may be made to the content and organization of this page, as circumstances change.

## **Presentation Changes**

Since the church has transitioned to worship online only, the methods of presentation have continued to change, though the liturgy remains a constant.

Responding to those who miss the beloved sanctuary yet do not like to see it empty, services are moving from home recordings to one-person-at-a-time recordings within the sanctuary, though not from traditional locations.

Thanks to much additional behind-the-scenes work by Audio/ Visual Specialist and Digital Archivist Tim Leatherwood and Organ Scholar Ben Kerswell, music will continue to be presented in a variety of ways — recordings from previous services, virtual choirs compiled digitally, soloists and small ensembles.

## Future?

While plans are being made to gradually re-open all activities at or related to St. Paul's, the Re-Gathering Task Force has determined that to have "worship as St. Paul's worships," open Sunday morning services will be in the last phase. That will allow full participation by all, complete with congregational singing.

Other opportunities for online worship and prayer are expanding to include Evening Prayer, Compline, and spiritual practice. Plans to conduct the sacraments of baptism and holy communion are being formulated and may begin soon.

And it is anticipated that after in-person worship is again possible, many of the approaches that have made online worship a robust experience will continue.

# Saluting Our Graduates

Although the COVID-19 pandemic took many of the joys from the usual celebrators of the high school graduation milestone, St. Paul's salutes their growth to this milestone and looks toward the future of this year's graduates.

This year's usual senior recognition Sunday morphed into a reading of each senior's names along with their picture on the May17 live-streamed worship service. # Meet Matt Perez, New Choral Scholars Director

Succeeding Choral Scholars Director Eddie Quaid, whose retirement was announced last month, is Matthew (Matt) Perez.



Perez also is a choral director at Cypress-Falls High School from where six of the 2010-20 Choral Scholars were drawn and where he directs five ensembles.

A 2012 graduate of Lamar University with a Bachelor of Music Degree, emphasis on choral music, he will graduate this summer with a Master's degree in Choral Conducting from Michigan State University.

Growing up in a Lutheran church, he worked with several church and

other choirs during his time in college, including the Southeast Texas Children's Chorus and the Beaumont Interfaith Choral Society.

He also has conducted choirs at the Texas Music Educators Association and American Choral Directors Association conferences, and is traveling to North Carolina in 2021 to conduct an All State Choir there.

Matt worked with Eddie to recruit another excellent Choral Scholars group for our next season - no small feat when it isn't possible to meet with the singers in person.

"We look forward to the Choral Scholars going from strength to strength under Matt's leadership," said Christopher Betts, St. Paul's Director of Music, "and we will bid farewell to Eddie and welcome to Matt just as soon as we are able."

Attracting some of the very best high school choral students from the Greater Houston area, this last season, 18 of St. Paul's 34 Choral Scholars were All State Choir singers.

Bringing these talented young musicians into St. Paul's introduces them to singing the finest sacred music in a liturgical setting and equips them to be a part of church choirs for the rest of their lives. Currently, four of the St. Paul's Choir members, including three staff singers, are former Choral Scholars.

- fabric (tightly woven, quilting cotton fabric, minimum 36" wide)
- elastic (1/2" or 1/4")
- Ziploc sandwich-size bags for packaging

Completed protective masks may be picked up in the church reception area. Two styles are being made: elastic (picture at left) and one-size-fits-all (pictures at center and right), which includes a small wire in the nose piece for shaping to your nose and face.

# The Communion of Saints

Each week as we recite the Apostles' Creed together during worship, we say that we believe in the communion of saints. But do we ever wonder how we live into this ancient belief at St. Paul's?

The communion of saints reflects a belief in the cycle of birth, death, and life eternal. In our church it begins with infant baptism and ends with a celebration of life on this earth and

the beginning of an eternal life. Tangible signs of these milestones are the baptismal fount and the Columbarium.

Interment in Christian churches dates back to the early days of our faith — from the martyrs in the catacombs, to the faithful in church crypts,

and to the creation of cemeteries attached to houses of worship.

Two decades ago, church leadership at St. Paul's offered an alternative to in-ground interment with the construction of the Columbarium where loved ones can be inurned. Located beneath the Narthex of the

church, the Columbarium is a place of reverence and retreat. Behind the ornate gate at the entrance lies a tranquil space featuring custom stained glass to complement the windows in our Sanctuary, a small chapel, and niches to house the remains of one thousand of the communion of saints — members of St. Paul's and their families, as well as friends of the church.

**Inurn:** To place the cremated remains of a deceased human being or animal into an urn. Today, the English word "inurnment" generally refers to placing cremated remains or "ashes" into an urn.

**Inter:** To place the remains of a deceased human being or animal into the ground, e.g., earth burial. Part of this word owes its genesis to the Latin word "terra," or "earth."

# Church Council Approves Re-Gathering Plan

Dear St. Paul's Family,

On June 2, our St. Paul's Church Council approved a plan for Re-Gathering in our buildings. We are taking a cautious approach, moving forward slowly based on the data from the Texas Medical Center and public health officials. (You can see the data yourself at www.tmc.edu.)

We will start with small groups and move forward in stages as we see the virus under control. We have not put dates on the different stages because as we watch the data, moving from stage to stage may be different, and different ministries will move at

different paces. It is currently our hope to move to small groups in mid-to-late June.

One of the interesting parts of the document is the idea that we need to evaluate all of our ministries and determine if some that may need to stop, continue, or grow. And it also gives us the opportunity to envision new ministries for St. Paul's future.

Please note that it will be a while before we gather for worship again, this is because we want to worship in a way that allows everyone to gather safely.

We don't call this a re-opening plan because St. Paul's United Methodist

Church has not ever been closed. The building may have been but as we have said, we are the church. Great worship has continued online, children, youth, and adults have continued to meet in a variety of ways online, you continue to be incredibly generous in your financial gifts, you keep giving to causes in our community, and we remain strong.

Please continue to keep our church and staff in your prayers as we begin gathering together in person again, always keeping our focus on loving God and loving our neighbor.

# Some Re-Gathering Plan Highlights

#### **Facilities**

The underlying concerns are cleaning and sanitation, signage for social distancing and health guidelines, establishing protocols to ensure social distancing for meetings and gatherings. Adult Groups

These will gradually move through the states of the current virtual groups to small groups at the church or outside and hybrid virtual/in-person gatherings. Food and snacks discouraged at those stages. When adult programming resumes at historical norms, virtual groups that are working well should be retained and new hybrid virtual/in-person options should be offered.

## Children (nursery through 5th grade)

Most activities remain online throughout most stages, though St. Paul's School has resumed in a limited way. Limited childcare and children's classes for certain situations may begin in the next to last of the six re-gathering stages.

## Youth (5th-12th grades)

In mid-June Youth will begin holding small group outdoor gatherings with social distancing. They may gradually add hybrid virtual/in-person programming.

#### **Justice and Compassion Ministries**

Throughout the stages, provide food and masks to EAC and grants for housing, host blood drives, and advocate for justice for the most vulnerable. At full re-opening the new Justice and Compassion Ministry Council will co-create with congregation new missional opportunities.

## **Congregational Care and Hospitality**

Graveside and inurnment services are being conducted with limited participants, and Hospitality will hold the first "Zoomed" Coffee with the Pastors for new members in late June. The next stage could include Fellowship Friday.

The fourth stage could include socially distanced gatherings such as prayer team meetings and healing circles plus limited health team initiatives and preparation for telemedicine project.

Prior to full re-gathering, the hospitality team may be trained on new protocols, lay visitation training may resume, clergy may resume hospital visits, and the telemedicine project will be initiated.
