
— Philippians 2:5-8


Many Meals Delivered to AmeriCorps Volunteers

Several St. Paul's Sunday School classes and other groups responded to the call to help feed out-of-state volunteers who are in Houston for several weeks to help with repairs to homes affected by the area's various weather-related disas-


ters. Among those groups were the Ordinary Life Women, who provided food for seven meals for each of the eight workers.

As explained by Marcy Boyd, one of the Ordinary Life Women, this cohort of young adults from around the country, three of whom are pictured at right, are participants in a 10-month full-time service program under AmeriCorps NCCC (www.americorps.gov).

The typical pattern is to work on three projects during their service; however COVID has disrupted that pattern. This group had previously

St. Paul's Worships in Sanctuary for First Time in More than a Year

The St. Paul's Monthly Newsletter - March 2020 was full of the joy of the coming Easter season. Then the April newsletter marked the abrupt change that all the world was about to experience for more than a year with this at the top of Page 1: "During this time of COVID-19 uncertainty, St. Paul's remains in connection in as many ways possible. Below is a summary of ways to connect: Worship Services. Worship online via www.stpaulshouston.org/live-stream or via the St. Paul's app at the normal service times: Sunday mornings at 8:30, 9:45, and 11:05. In lieu of the mid-week communion services, a Message is live-streamed at 12:15 pm Wednesdays."

Much of that pattern for worship remained in place, and new worship opportunities were added: a Monday night Compline service and a monthly Service of Holy Communion, both via Zoom. After some outdoor Communion services during Advent, a Sunday morning service was held outdoors from January 24 to May 16 — two on Palm/Passion Sunday and three on Easter Sunday — with required reservations, masking, and socially distanced seating. And, based on the traditional Lessons and Carols normally sung by the St. Paul's Choir, an outdoor Advent/Christmas production was presented outdoors. And "virtual" and "Zoom" became oftenused words for most Sunday School classes and other groups as various coping mechanisms came into place as well.

Pentecost Sunday, May 23, 2021, marked the first official move of worship services indoors with services at 8 and 11 am, complete with registration and social distancing but allowing the wearing of masks based on COVID vaccination status. (Pictures on page 5.) The Mid-Week Communion service moved back inside on Wednesday, May 26, at noon, and many Sunday School classes and other small groups have begun meeting at the church, some in hybrid forms, allowing those who prefer to join in via Zoom.

At this time, it is anticipated that the Monday Compline service will remain on Zoom for the near future, and the Sanctuary services will continue at only at 11 am through June 27 with pre-recorded services broadcast at 8:30, 9:45, and 11 am via www.stpaulshouston.org/stream or the church's YouTube channel. Each Sunday service broadcast entails more than 100 volunteer and staff hours to complete each week, not including the hours spent rehearsing sermons, prayers, and music.

It also is currently anticipated that starting on July 4, the Sunday morning services will be in the sanctuary at 8:30 and 11 am, and both will be provided live via www.stpauls houston.org/stream.

Official announcements of these changes or additional modifications will be provided via various St. Paul's media.



Originally scheduled to sing at St. Paul's on April 15, 2021, the Tallis Scholars are now scheduled for Friday, April 22, 2022 at 7:30 pm. More than four decades of performance and a catalogue of award-winning recordings for Gimell, Peter Phillips and The Tallis Scholars have done more than any other group to establish sacred vocal music of the Renaissance as one of the great repertoires of Western classical music.

Based in Cambridge, England, they have sought to bring Renaissance works to a wider audience in churches, cathedrals, and venues on every continent on the planet except Antarctica. These include the Royal Albert Hall; the Sistine Chapel; the Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall, New York; the Philharmonic Hall, Berlin; Saint Mark's, Venice; Seoul Arts Centre; Shakespeare's Globe Theatre and Wigmore Hall, London; Royal Concertgebouw, Amsterdam; Beijing Concert Hall; Megaron, Athens; and the Sydney Opera House.

The Tallis Scholars continue to develop their exclusive sound, praised by reviewers for its supple clarity and tone, and to bring fresh interpretations to music by contemporary as well as past composers, such as Pärt, Tavener, Whitacre, Muhly, and Jackson.
