Pastor's Message

I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together! All who follow Jesus, all around the world? Yes, we're the church together.

— The United Methodist Hymnal What do you picture when you hear the word "church"? What do the people of our congregation or our community picture? What does the church look like in the days of COVID?



How would our church be different if we really lived as though "church" was a gathering of people worshipping and serving God, defined by

the life of Jesus rather than our address?

I was thinking about this recently after I read an article in *Circuit Rider* magazine about the Rethink Church campaign going on, and when someone told me what others in the community were saying about our church.

Church is when we collect money and supplies for hurricane relief. Church is dropping off items for sack lunches at the Emergency Aid Coalition. Church is when we gather online for Holy Communion or Compline. Church is a phone call to a friend who might be really lonely in these days. Church can happen in all sorts of circumstances.

Jessica Kelley wrote, "Buildings provide a home base for countless ministries of the church, not the least of which is a place to gather for worship. The church itself, however, will not be defined by the height of its steeple but the reach of its compassion, not the number of seats but the

Most of us have been through a hurricane, so we know the pain of dislocation and loss. - Waterproof roof tarps (UV resistant, reinforced, minimum of 20'x15')
- Lumber (2x4x8 studs or longer)
- Button cap nails and roofing nails
- 3" deck screws and nails
- Work gloves
- Non-perishable canned food items (preferably ring-pull lids)
- Bottled water
- Baby items (diapers of all size, wipes, formula)
- Adult diapers
- Cleaning supplies (Clorox wipes, paper towels, brooms, trash bags, masks)

Rachel Wiggs New Director of Communications


To ensure consistency of communications messaging, Rachel Wiggs has been named Director of Communicators in addition to her role as Ministerial Assistant to the Senior Pastor.

Enjoy Chimney Swift Evenings at St. Paul's

St. Paul's provides shelter to hundreds of chimney swifts as they pass through Houston en route to South America in late summer.

After staying in the air all day eating airborne insects, at dusk chimney swifts begin swirling around our chimney before diving in for the night.

Primarily due to habitat loss, chimney swifts are categorized as "vulnerable," though not yet endangered.

In lieu of an organized Swift Night Out to count them alongside Houston Audubon (*www.houstonaudubon.org/ birding/bird-surveys/swifts-over-houston*) and Bellaire's Nature Discovery Center, this year we invite you to watch the birds from the large parking lot after sunset any evening.

Computers to MacGregor

Thanks to everyone who stepped up to furnish computers for the children of our partner school, MacGregor Elementary, to use for distance learning.

By the end of August, more than \$12,100 and several laptops were collected to support the educational needs of these vulnerable



EAC Adapts to Serve Growing Clientele

The Emergency Aid Coalition (EAC) continues to serve approximately 400 sack lunches each weekday, requiring clients to practice physical distancing and providing masks for those without.

Clothing is now distributed by appointment with no physical contact.

Ongoing needs include boxer shorts in sizes M, L, and XL; men's jeans, sizes 30, 32, and 34 in various lengths; and large tubs of peanut butter. Also needed are fresh fruit (apples, oranges, bananas); peanut butter or cheese crackers; large jars of grape jelly, canned fruit, individually packaged trail mix, and "pop-top" items with protein such as tuna, Vienna sausages, pork and beans, bean dip, and Chef Boyardee pasta meals.



Going Forward

Congregational Survey Summary

Earlier this summer, we asked the St. Paul's community to participate in a congregation-wide survey. The response was amazing! More than five hundred of you took the time to share your thoughts; we are grateful for your insights.

In creating a snapshot of St. Paul's at this pivotal point in our history, the survey respondents have enabled us to begin determining what to stop, what to continue, and how to grow for the future post-COVID. We anticipate the next phase will involve small group conversations to envision the next steps in our growth, possibly via Zoom. A summary of responses follows. What brought you to St. Paul's?*

Not surprisingly, the majority of respondents were attracted by St. Paul's style of worship — with strong emphasis on preaching and music — as well as location, architecture and theology.

Who Were the Respondents?

At 86.5%, the bulk were St. Paul's members, and almost twice as many females (61%) responded as males (37.4%). While all ages groups live in the households of respondents, we are a largely older congregation:

Although 34.9% live within 10 mies from the church, more than a quarter (26.5%) drive more than 15 miles to worship. While distance is not a limiting factor for 71.2% to participate in church activities beyond Sunday worship, a key inhibitor was traffic.

Who do we strive to be?

The words of the *Vision Statement* strike a chord with the respondents: 44.9% strongly agree, and 37% agree; 10.9% are neutral; and the remaining 7.2% disagree or strongly disagree.

However, respondents had strong opinions about specific phrases in the Vision Statement.

The word "cathedral" is a flashpoint for many, who note that by definition, a cathedral is the seat of a bishop, and in the Methodist Church, bishops do not have seats; the usage focuses on a building, not on a community. Others pointed out that it presents an image of exclusion/exclusivity that is inconsistent with the vision of inclusion expressed in the statement.

Others questioned the use of "embodying diversity," noting that the phrase is misleading in that our congregation is overwhelmingly white: we may promote diversity but we do not see it in the pews on Sunday.

Respondents agreed that we are "inclusive," particularly with LGBTQ issues, but we could do more. And we could be more inclusive and welcoming to visitors and new members.

Many noted an absence of any reference to Jesus Christ or Christianity

Agreement with the *Mission Statement's* wording also is overwhelming, with 40.8% strongly agreeing; 42.5% agreeing; 13.3% neutral; and only 3.4% disagreeing/strongly disagreeing.

However, a large number questioned key phrases. Respondents wondered if "vibrant" is an accurate description of St. Paul's traditional worship services. Some expressed a desire for more variety in Creeds, music, worship, and preaching styles.

Others expressed concern that the Mission Statement is too focused on the concept "Enter to Worship" and diminishes the "Depart to Serve" element. Some believe that the statement is too broad and question the outreach to "all peoples and all communities." A number noted that a reference to Jesus should be central. Last, while the Mission Statement addresses "hospitality," many new members struggle to find a place here

How well do we communicate?

Most (92%) are happy with the amount of communication they receive from St. Paul's. The majority utilize more traditional on-line resources, with the *Chimes* being the most read and best regarded. Approximately 65% utilize the website. Both the weekly pastoral message and the special messages are viewed by approximately 60%, and more than half use the Sunday Bulletin regularly.

More than half found social media to be non-applicable, and many stated that they are unaware of certain communication vehicles.

How do we live out our faith?

Pre-Covid 19, respondents were equally split between attending an adult study class or Sunday school class. However, currently 40% of respondents no longer attend a class.

Comments include a desire for more weekday and evening Bible studies and more Disciple study offering and that Fellowship Fridays are good for community building

Examples of other programming or opportunities to be explored included Family-oriented mission activities; Anti-racism programming; Local outreach, particularly to the 3rd Ward; Social justice action; Interfaith activities/lectures; and Retreats.

How do we support our church?*

Respondents live out their vows of membership to St. Paul's by their

- Presence in worship and other gatherings 83%
- Annual pledge/gift 56%
- Recurring gift 49%
- Prayer for the congregation, as individual or in a prayer group - 45%
- Volunteering at church 32%
- Expertise used to support the church, programs, or missions 20%
- Volunteering as a teacher or mentor (children, youth, adults) 13%
- Church leadership 12% Yet many still seek ways to take a more active role in the life of St Paul's.
