The difference was, they were feeding each other.


That is the way a church should look, feeding each other, when that happens, we've come close to heaven!



Green Team Initiative Update

by Helen Spaw, Associate Director of Faith Formation St. Paul's is committed to environmental stewardship. Our current focus is to create a single-use-plastic-free zone at St. Paul's and reduce our overall waste and energy usage. We look forward to working with everyone on this initiative.

On Sunday mornings you will notice re-useable coffee mugs and water cups at our hospitality stations. Everyone is welcome to bring their own water bottle and/or coffee mug to refill at these stations. Hand sanitizer also is located at these stations. Lights are turned off when a room is left empty and kept off when possible.

For Celebration Sunday, the disposable plates, cups, and utensils that were used were made from compostable sugarcane and corn. These disposables required no cutting down of trees or plastic waste.

We are transitioning to using only environmentally friendly products such as these when we are not able to offer re-useable options. For indoor dining events, we are using porcelain crockery and stainless steel flatware.

St. Paul's also has joined The Interfaith Environmental Network of Houston (IENOH). This network "seeks to



empower the faith community in Houston to advocate and act collectively as stewards of the environment by (a) fostering a strong connection between the faith community of greater Houston and Hous-

ton-area environmental organizations in order to reach shared goals and (b) empowering their members to advocate and take action on behalf of the environment." This group is affiliated with the Texas Interfaith Center for Public Policy, headquartered in Austin, which also houses Texas InterfaithPower and Light.

Telehealth Clinic to Open Sept 13

The long-awaited telehealth clinic initiated by St. Paul's will begin providing basic healthcare services to Houston's under/uninsured population on Monday, September 13.

In Abraham Station, this is a partnership between St. Paul's and the University of Houston in operation with the Emergency Aid Coalition (EAC).

"The team has dreamed of this day for three years," said



Rev. Andrew Wolfe, Pastor for Congregational Care. "I am so grateful to all who've been part of

this project — UH, donors, board members, and the EAC. What a powerful statement of faith to open a clinic that cares for our community by addressing healthcare inequalities."

St. Paul's popular Friday-night program for children 4 months to 5th grade resumes on Friday, September 10.



IMGH Tapestry Gala to Honor Rev. Dr. Jim Bankston


St. Paul's Senior Pastor Emeritus Rev. Dr. Jim Banks ton will be among those honored at this year's Interfaith
